

## Bison Quiz

### Related educational topics or areas of focus

This Bison Quiz activity is designed for Year/grade 3 - 4 students (age 8 - 10).

### The Bison

The animal that people call a Buffalo in North America and Canada is really a Bison. Its correct name is American Bison. Bison are the largest mammals in North America. They have a hump, and huge heads and shoulders, and both males and females have short, curved horns.

There are two types of American Bison – the Plains Bison and the Wood Bison.

The Plains Bison is smaller and has a lighter coloured coat. It has thick wool like a cap, between its horns, a thick beard and a mane around its throat.

Both types of bison have a long, shaggy, winter coat which comes off in clumps or patches in spring.





### The Bison continued

Bison are ungulates, meaning they have hooves – and they are herbivores, or plant eaters. They graze on prairie grasses and grass-like plants. They eat in the morning and evening, and rest during the day.

Bison can live in hot and cold climates, in rough rocky areas or on flat prairies (grassy plains with no trees). The animals were very important to Native American people, who hunted them for food and used the skins for clothes. They wasted nothing and used all the parts of the animal for different things.

In the 1800s, after Europeans arrived, there was a lot more hunting and the bison became endangered. Today herds are being restocked and the bison is a protected animal.
